Tiny Cities: Narrative Description

Since the dawn of time, humans have turned their faces to the sky and dreamed of taking wing. Of flying high above their earth-bound homes. Of soaring through clear skies. Of being a bird.

But what have birds been dreaming of all this time?

Do they dream of us?

Do birds dream of walking tall down the streets of our immense cities? Wearing our fine clothing? Enjoying a refreshing glass of...bread?

Tiny Cities is a 30-minute solo contemporary circus show featuring bread-filled wine glasses, cardboard-box juggling, life-sized pigeons, live costume changes, and wire walking.

Tiny Cities is an absurd and whimsical celebration of Columba Livia, the common pigeon. Perched on a power line, windowsill or park bench, the pigeon is the wildness in our cities, inviting us to change our perspective and see our homes in a new light.

The slackwire set-up forms the stage for **Tiny Cities** and evokes one of the most ubiquitous features of the urban landscape. Power lines. This show reinterprets the landscape of the city in which it is presented, injecting it with magic and possibility. Glancing overhead to see a pigeon sitting on a power line will never be the same again.

Tiny Cities builds community by bringing together an audience to experience high-level circus arts in their own neighborhood. This show can serve as an accessible introduction to the world of contemporary circus where performers use the circus arts to tell stories that are compelling, relatable and inspiring because of their humanity not just their virtuosity.

The primary circus discipline in **Tiny Cities** is the slackwire, which is essentially a completely loose tightwire. Slackwire combines the excitement, drama, height and thrill of wire-walking and aerial arts with relatively minimal rigging requirements. **Tiny Cities** can be presented indoors or outdoors (see tech rider for specific needs) and can be performed a maximum of two times per day.

Tiny Cities: Technical Requirements


Space: 25 feet x 10 feet

Height: 12 feet

Duration: 30 minutes

Sound: PA system with the ability to broadcast clear, quality sound for both performer and audience members

Lighting: Simple, clear lighting for good visibility of the slackwire and other props (unless performance takes place outdoors before sunset)



A. Flat, level playing space 25 feet wide and 10 feet deep (5 feet of clearance on either side of the rope).

A2. Low mats if performance space is over pavement.

B. Two sturdy anchor points at or near ground level, at least 30 feet apart (up to 50 feet), capable of supporting a dynamic load of at least 1,000 lbs each.

The slackwire can be rigged using pre-existing structures including trees, posts, structural beams, etc. and additionally weights (concrete, water, etc.) capable of supporting a load of at least 1,000 lb each may be used.
